

LECH WALESA

We are honored to announce that by exclusive arrangement while in Gdańsk, our group will have a private meeting with Lech Walesa, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, and leader of the Solidarity movement in its fight against Communism.

A worker in Gdańsk's Lenin Shipyard, Walesa emerged as a worldwide symbol of the resistance against Communism during the shipyard workers' strike of 1980 and the establishment of the Solidarity labor movement. Despite winning the right to form an independent union, Walesa and Solidarity were forced to continue their struggle against the Soviet-backed regime of General Jaruzelski, which jailed Walesa and imposed martial law in Poland in December 1981.

In 1983, Walesa received the Nobel Peace Prize, a watershed moment widely considered to have been the first crack in the Iron Curtain of Soviet Communism that crumbled with the Berlin Wall in 1989. Only the third foreign dignitary, after the Marquis de Lafayette and Winston Churchill, to address a joint session of the U.S. Congress in 1989, Walesa served as President of Poland from 1990 to 1995.

We are indeed proud that this Polish hero and international symbol of the pursuit of freedom and democracy has agreed to meet with our group.

The 15th-century Gdańsk Crane is the largest medieval port crane in Europe and symbolizes Poland's glorious maritime heritage and seafaring traditions.

BERGEN, NORWAY

Thursday, June 5

Brightly colored houses front forested snow-capped mountains in Bergen, one of Scandinavia's preeminent ports for nearly 1,000 years and a prominent former member of the Hanseatic League. Its medieval wooden houses have earned Bergen the distinction of being a UNESCO World Heritage site and provide unique insight into life during the Middle Ages. Upon arrival, transfer to the M.S. LE DIAMANT.

CRUISING THE NORWEGIAN FJORDS

Friday, June 6

Norway's majestic fjords offer the most stunning coastal scenery in Europe. Cruise past traditional farmsteads and villages along the placid Sognefjord and Aurlandsfjord, flanked by soaring, snowcapped mountains plunging dramatically into the cobalt blue waters at their base. This evening, join the Captain for a special welcome reception and dinner.

Saturday, June 7

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK

Sunday, June 8

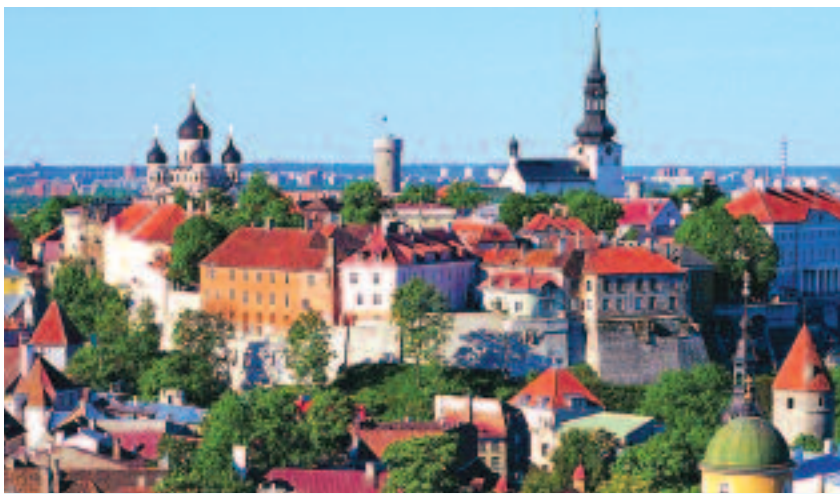
Board a canal boat for a morning cruise through the heart of Copenhagen. See Christiansborg Palace, the Naval Church, the Stock Exchange and the famous "Little Mermaid" statue, which honors the work of Denmark's favorite author, Hans Christian Andersen. Disembark and pass by Tivoli Gardens, Amalienborg Palace and the King's Garden en route to the famous Strøget pedestrian street. Enjoy time at leisure in Copenhagen this afternoon.

GDAŃSK, POLAND

Monday, June 9

Arrive in Gdańsk, a historic city that boasts some of Poland's finest medieval and Renaissance architecture. In 1980, Gdańsk's Lenin Shipyard workers, led by Lech Walesa, founded the Solidarity movement—the first independent trade union in Eastern Europe and the key factor in the Polish struggle against Communism. Tour the historic yards, view an exhibit detailing the history of the Solidarity movement and see the Monument to the Shipyard Worker, raised in memory of a violent strike in 1970. Continue to the Old Town and visit the remarkably restored 14th-century Town Hall, a beautiful Gothic structure noted for its





Tallinn is quickly becoming a cosmopolitan hub of European culture and commerce; yet the city still retains its history, for example, in the 600-year-old spires and gables of its skyline.

Dutch Mannerist interior. Beautifully restored after World War II, it is now the home of the Museum of the History of Gdańsk.

By exclusive arrangement, meet privately on the ship with Lech Walesa. He will share his insights into the Solidarity movement, which played a seminal role in the pursuit of Polish democracy, and the collapse of Communism in Eastern Europe.

KLAIPEDA, LITHUANIA

Tuesday, June 10

Arrive in Klaipeda, a Hanseatic trading town founded in 1252, and transfer to the seaside resort of Palanga to visit the Amber Museum, housed in a former palace surrounded by a beautifully landscaped botanical park. Continue with a leisurely stroll along Palanga's picturesque beaches.

RIGA, LATVIA

Wednesday, June 11

Once a member of the Hanseatic League, Riga has been listed as a UNESCO World Heritage site for its combination of national romantic, art nouveau, neo-Gothic, neo-Baroque and ultramodern architecture. Attend a specially arranged organ recital in the Dome Cathedral. Tour Old Riga and see the Great Guild Hall Square, Riga Castle and several artfully designed buildings, including the Blackhead's House, a magnificent 14th-century guildhouse destroyed in World War II. It was rebuilt with bricks donated by Riga's citizens to commemorate the city's 800th anniversary in 2001. The afternoon in Riga is free for independent pursuits.

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN

Thursday, June 12

One of the most handsome of Scandinavian cities, Stockholm is characterized by a harmonious mixture of modern and medieval structures on 14 small islands scattered among open bays and narrow channels. Visit City Hall, one of the great architectural works of the 20th century. The Nobel prizes are awarded each year in its expansive Blue Hall.

Tour the Vasa Museum to see the 17th-century warship recovered from Stockholm's harbor in 1961. Walk through the historic *Gamla Stan* (Old Town) to see Stockholm's cathedral, the Gothic Storkyrkan, the coronation site of Sweden's rulers.

TALLINN, ESTONIA

Friday, June 13

Having largely escaped the ravages of World War II, Tallinn's Old Town has remained virtually unchanged for the past 600 years and has been designated a UNESCO World Heritage site. During the walking tour, visit the Gothic-style Town Hall and the Toomkirk, a magnificent 13th-century Lutheran cathedral believed to be Estonia's oldest church. Also see important landmarks in Tallinn, including the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral and the 13th-century Church of St. Nicholas.

ST. PETERSBURG, RUSSIA

Saturday, June 14

Arrive in the marvelous city of St. Petersburg, founded by Peter the Great in 1703. Spend two days exploring the city's legendary landmarks, scattered across more than 100 islands linked by six times as many bridges.

In Stockholm's most historic district, the Gamla Stan, streets with narrow alleys and pedestrian walkways lined with colorful buildings.





Following lunch, drive along the main thoroughfare, Nevsky Prospect, lined with exquisite Russian Baroque and neoclassical architecture. Visit 19th-century St. Isaac's Cathedral, crowned by a striking golden dome. Tour the city's first building, Peter and Paul Fortress, which was constructed in 1703 to defend Russia against Swedish invasion and to secure Russia's access to the sea. The impressive Baroque Cathedral of Sts. Peter and Paul contains the tombs of all of Russia's czars, from Peter the Great to Nicholas II.

This evening, attend an optional ballet performance in the Hermitage Theater or an optional Russian folklore show in the Nikolevsky Art Center.

ST. PETERSBURG

Sunday, June 15

Begin your day with a specially arranged early opening tour of the Hermitage, a former czarist palace and one of the world's greatest art museums. Its spectacular collection is rivaled only by its ornate interiors.

Enjoy the afternoon at leisure, or join an optional excursion to the imperial compound of Pushkin and Catherine Palace, an elaborate Baroque edifice built in 1741 by Peter the Great's daughter, Elizabeth I, in honor of her

mother. The tour includes the extraordinary Amber Room, whose six tons of solid amber, deftly carved and framed in gold leaf, was the crown jewel of Russian art until it was looted by the Nazis in 1941. The room was meticulously reconstructed to commemorate St. Petersburg's 300th birthday in 2003. Or, join an optional tour of Peter the Great's summer estate and palace at Petrodvoretz. Lined with exquisite gilded fountains and white marble statues, the palace gardens are among the most spectacular in the world.

This evening, attend the Captain's farewell champagne reception.

Monday, June 16

Disembark the ship this morning and transfer to the airport for your flight home.

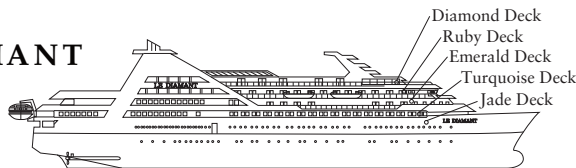

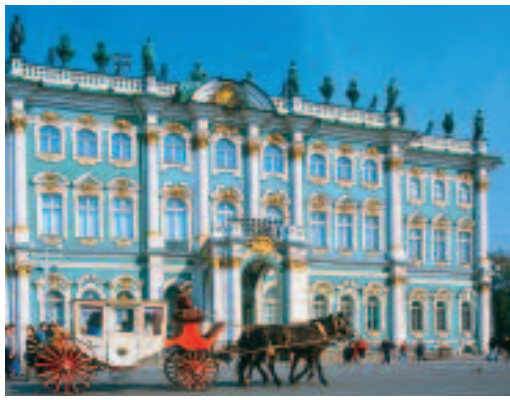
