Their eclectic instrumentation includes stringed jaranas and requintos, quijada (donkey jawbone), marimbol (West African bass), cajón (percussion box), and a tarima (wooden platform used to tap dance/stomp the zapateado).

The foremost jazz violinist of her generation, Regina Carter returns to Wesleyan with the United States debut of her Quartet featuring guitarist Marvin Sewell, bassist Chris Lightcap, and drummer Alvester Garnett. This group previously performed in October 2014 at the Festival Stradivari at the Museo del Violino in Cremona, Italy. Ms. Carter was awarded a MacArthur Fellowship in 2006, and released the album Southern Comfort in 2014. At Wesleyan, she will interpret her roots—including Cajun fiddle music, early gospel, and work songs (her grandfather was an Alabama coal miner)—through a modern lens, in addition to repertoire spanning her entire career.

Marc Bamuthi Joseph returns to Wesleyan to share the inspiration behind the creation of /peh-LO-tah/—a performance piece that blends spoken word poetry, dance, music, and shadow animation; expressing a passion for the physical liberation of soccer ("the beautiful game"); and acknowledging the insistent prejudices that divide humanity into separate and unequal parts. Following a week-long residency with his collaborators to begin developing movement vocabulary for /peh-LO-tah/, Mr. Joseph shares excerpts of that investigation in a work-in-progress showing.


All programs, artists, and dates are subject to change. The outdoor concert will be moved indoors in the event of rain. All Center for the Arts facilities are air-conditioned.

Okwui Okpokwasili: **Embodied Performance/Making** the Invisible Visible

Okwui Okpokwasili is an active collaborator and creator in live performance, currently developing the work Poor People's TV Room. She is looking at the strategies of collective action among women's groups and historic movements to construct an

embodied narrative that investigates how to undo the erasure of women of color as active agents in their own liberation. At Wesleyan, she will discuss her attempt to make a singular performance piece that is not documentary or political agitprop, but a dynamic interrogation of the art of making a story, and the reading of race and gender in performance. Ms. Okpokwasili is the recipient of the 2015 Danspace/Institute for Curatorial Practice in Performance Creative Artist Residency.
