SYLLABUS: READING AND WRITING POETRY

INFORMATION SHEET

NOTE: This is an "immersion," or "special schedule" course. Dates: January 23 and 24; February 6, 7, and 13

Preparation for the course is minimal, because most or the scheduled readings will be done out loud in class, as part of the daily lecture. About 2/3 of each class day will be devoted to group writing exercises (with discussion) and to solitary writing time. 1/3 for lecture and discussion. See the Schedule Sheet for details. All writing for the course, except for the final project, will be done on site, during class time.

<u>The Final Project</u> is a portfolio of writings by you (prose and/or poetry), showing your mastery of the ideas, readings, and writing experiences that constitute the course. **Length**: About 10 – 15 poems or drafts of poems, and 3-5 short prose pieces that can be analytic or prose-poems. Suggestions for contents of portfolios will be made during the course.

Due: Tuesday, March 2 You will have about 2 weeks, including 2 weekends, before you final portfolio of poems, prose-poems, and critical prose is due. Much of the contents of your portfolio will have been written in class time, and some drafts will have been shared with fellow students in small feedback groups.

Delivering your final project: Please <u>email me</u> a copy (ghughes@wesleyan.edu) *and* <u>also send a paper copy by post addressed to the GLS office</u>, High Street, Middletown, CT 06459. I expect to have them read and graded by March 31. Would you like the paper copy posted back to you? If so, tell me and I will ask the GLS office to do so.

<u>Readings and preparation:</u> The syllabus indicates what poems we will probably consider each day, in the morning lecture and at other times in that day.

For the FIRST DAY, note that you are **expected** to read the brief introductory pages of our main text, *Sing Me The Creation*, by Paul Matthews. It would be best if you can also read the selections from Whitman's *Leaves of Grass* indicated on the syllabus: various so-called chants from his "Song of Myself," and two of his longer poems. But we will take time to read those poems out loud as part of the morning's work in any case.

Thereafter, reading ahead will help you enjoy the course, but it is **not expected.** A Possible exception might be the THIRD DAY i.e. the second Saturday (February 6). It comes nearly two weeks after the first weekend of class and might be a good time for you to come with prepared readings. We will decide this on Sunday January 24.

<u>Writing:</u> Plan to devote up to two hours to solitary writing, re-writing, experimenting, imitating, parodying class day. Each day, we will also do numerous exercises from *Sing Me The Creation* many of them tailored especially for group work.

<u>Attendance</u>: It is expected. Come to all classes; stay for the entire class: 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. <u>Daily schedule</u>: 9-10:30 lecture and discussion. Break. 11-12:15 writing exercises.

12:15-1:30 Lunch. 1:30 – 3 Writing. Break. 3:30- 5:00 writing exercises.
