
March: Thinking about COLLEGE

In March, our students attended different sessions, all relating to college. Freshman and sophomores worked with Miguel and Jennifer and completed *Smart Goals* and *College Success Plans*, which are used to give students a chance to plan their years in high school. Juniors started a pre-college scholarship application called Questbridge. In addition to learning and starting the application, students discussed the essay questions and short answers with one another. Seniors attended a Financial Aid session where they learned how to break down financial aid offers from colleges and pick the best school for them, while still being able to afford it.

April: Narratio and Learning Mindset

In April, students and parents attended two sessions: Narratio and Learning Mindset. Performance Consultant Katrina McTeague had students do interactive activities to demonstrate the difference between a fixed mindset and a growth mindset. Additionally, students participated in a creative writing and reflection workshop run by Wesleyan student Ahmed Badr, an Iraqi refugee and founder and creator of Narratio, a non-profit organization that invites youth to share their story through the publishing of poetry, photography, art and narrative. 

Let's Get Ready SAT Prep

The Spring edition of the Let's Get Ready (LGR) SAT Prep course for juniors got underway in February at Wesleyan and ran until the beginning of May. The course included an Intro Session for students and parents, a pre and post diagnostic test (to measure improvement), and 16 classes, which met Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5:30-8:30pm. The course prepared students for the May SAT, and included registration for the test and fee waivers (registration fee of about \$55 dollars waived). The course also contained a college prep element, including college essay draft writing and a college visit to Eastern Connecticut State University and Wesleyan University. Students were coached by trained Wesleyan students. A final ceremony with gifts, awards, and a financial aid presentation wrapped up the course. LGR was partly funded by the Community Foundation of Middlesex County.

Points System

As part of their participation in the UBMS program, students had the opportunity to earn points for taking advantage of all the services and resources we have available to prepare them to enroll and persist in college.
