The Long Lane Farm and Garden Project: We began in the spring of 2001 with the founding of the Washington Street Garden, and in March 2004 received permission from the University to expand into one acre of the Long Lane property. We are an initiative to build an educational and practical resource for the Wesleyan and Middletown communities to address the problems surrounding current practices of agriculture in the United States, namely the unnecessary use of non-renewable resources, the broken connection between farmer and consumer, the eradication of important centers of community activity, and the degraded quality of both our environment and diet. In addition, the project considers

building practices, waste systems, and energy and fuel use. The Long Lane Farm project is now searching to engage the Middletown community and Wesleyan in a holistic discussion of environmentalism, conservation, community, and sustainability that will guide each of our efforts.
