Borders and Commons: the Struggle over Political Imagination

Miriam Ticktin is an Associate Professor of Anthropology at the Eugene Lang College and co-director of the Zolberg Institute on Migration and Mobility at The New School for Social Research in New York. She is the author of *Casualties of Care: Immigration and the Politics of Humanitarianism in France* (University of California Press, 2011); and co-editor (with Ilana Feldman) of *In the Name of Humanity: The Government of Threat and Care* (Duke University Press, 2010), along with various other articles and book chapters. She is a founding editor of the journal *Humanity: An International Journal of Human Rights, Humanitarianism, and Development*. Her research has focused in the broadest sense on what it means to make political claims in the name of a universal humanity.
