Did you know? Gamelan is the traditional music of Java and Bali in Indonesia, played by an ensemble made up of predominantly percussive instruments, most commonly including metallophones played by mallets, and a set of hand-played drums called kendhang, which register the beat. Other instruments include xylophones, bamboo flutes, and a bowed instrument called a rebab. In Indonesian culture, the gamelan is an essential accompaniment to puppet shows, dances, feasts, and ceremonies.

Did you know? Wesleyan owns one of the finest, most beautiful gamelans in the world, a set of mostly gong and metallophone instruments made of bronze.

Changing Visions: Prints, Drawings, and Photographs During the Weimar Republic and After

The Weimar Republic in Germany lasted only fourteen short years, from 1919 until the seizure of power by Adolf Hitler and the establishment of the Third Reich in 1933. Yet from 1919 to 1933, artists thrived in an atmosphere of radical change. Otto Dix and George Grosz created biting social satire. Käthe Kollwitz advocated for the poor. Josef Albers, Lyonel Feininger, and Wassily Kandinsky promoted new design principles at the Bauhaus School. August Sander and Ilse Bing expanded the possibilities for photography. The exhibition *Changing Visions* is drawn from the Davison Art Center collection, and explores the creative ferment during the Weimar Republic, and the travels of artists who fled after 1933 and brought new artistic ideas to audiences in Europe and the Americas.



Listening in Reverse is a two-day conference focused on influences—forgotten, hidden, suppressed, or just not considered—and featuring concerts, talks, presentations, and other interventions starting at Noon on Saturday. The premise that any sound, object, or behavior can reward close attention and, consequently, can act as source, material, or shaping influence for a piece of music is more or less foundational to musical experimentalism. Equally foundational is that the music made offers an experience independent from these influences. But listeners, whether they are composers or performers or audience members, are rarely innocent of a desire for meaning. And that meaning may be found inside the experience of a piece and outside in anything that shaped the piece, or in the interplay between the two.
