Accepting Thesis Students:

Professor Hilary Barth

Cognition and development

- PSYC220 Cognitive Psychology, PSYC230 Developmental Psychology, or a different course with Professor Barth.
- Research experience with Professor Barth by first semester of junior year.
- Contact Professor Barth to discuss your request to consider a thesis project at the beginning of
 the second semester of junior year, at the latest. Earlier is best for theses with child research
 participants, because they usually require full-time summer data collection.
- Accepting thesis students.

Professor Sarah Carney

Law and psychology

- PSYC277 Psychology and the Law and/or PSYC213 Research Methods in Social Psychology or a different course with Professor Carney with a minimum grade of B.
- Please contact Professor Carney to discuss your thesis ideas and to request thesis advising no later than your second semester of your junior year.
- Thesis proposal (if applicable) must be completed prior to the start of the senior year.
- Accepting thesis students.

Professor Lucy De Souza

Social identity; applied social psychology (organizational contexts); intergroup contact; allyship.

- Coursework in statistics and quantitative research methods.
- Coursework or research lab experience with Professor De Souza.
- Discussion of thesis with Professor De Souza by mid-junior year.
- Accepting thesis students: must have met on thesis idea(s) and submitted thesis proposal draft by spring break (spring semester, junior year)

Professor Royette Dubar

Sleep; adolescent and emerging adulthood development; psychosocial functioning; technology use

Professor Scott Plous

Prejudice and discrimination, ethical issues relating to animals and the environment, the development of mobile and web-based psychology.

Prof. Patricia M. Rodriguez Mosquera

- Not accepting thesis students.

Professor Charles Sanislow

Clinical Science: Diagnosis and Assessment, Psychopathology Mechanisms, Transdiagnostic Constructs, and Clinical Neuroscience.

- Quantitative-based 200-Level Research Methods Course.
- PSYC251 Psychopathology completed by the end of the junior year (earlier is recommended, if possible).

Professor Anna Shusterman

- Recommended: Research methods, statistics, & PSYC230 Development Psychology.
- Required: one course with Prof. Shusterman.
- Thesis projects are usually reserved for students who begin joint work with Prof. Shusterman before the fall of senior year.
