In the Heights speaks not only about the community that inhabits New York City's Washington Heights neighborhood, but to our deep need for a sense of belonging-wherever we come from or have arrived at. It asks us to interrogate what "home" actually means. Each character brings a different perspective of where, what, or who "home" may be. While the main focus rests on the experiences of immigrants and second-generation Latinxs, In the Heights also explores how this question permeates the daily lives of many other Americans. As such, the story shows us that "home" may be where you grew up, the place your ancestors came from, and the neighborhood in which you now live; it may be evoked by language, be present in the relationships with people of different backgrounds, or found in cultures other than our own. At least in the New World, "home" has come to be more than land and heritage, but appears at the intersection of the many places, cultures, and peoples that make us who we are. I find that the complexity of this seemingly simple question is one of the reasons why this award-winning musical has touched so many spectators: it reminds us all of the importance of community, be it imagined, longed for, or lived, regardless of one's background and in spite of difference. In the Heights made it to the most mainstream platform in American theater-Broadway-and yet contributed change as only subversive works can. By unapologetically redefining who may be visible on the commercial stage, In the Heights continues to welcome new audiences across the world.

Our production has strived to extend this welcome to new players on and off stage. Of the 22 students in the cast, only one had ever been in a Theater faculty production before. Actually, few are Theater majors—most come from academic departments and programs such as Biology, Computer Science, English, German, Math, MB&B, Latin American Studies, Psychology, Sociology, and others. Over half are first-year students or sophomores. The same is true for our backstage crew: this production is the first theater experience for many of them. The band brings together students from Wesleyan, and guest musicians from the Hartt School of Music and the Middletown community. I feel lucky to have had the opportunity to collaborate with Marcela Oteíza, Nadya Potemkina, Leslie Weinberg, and guest artists Jiyoun Chang and Mike Skinner. The production counted on the dedication and talent of Charles Carroll, Christian Milik, Robert Russo, and Suzanne Sadler. The additional support of guest technical staff Tony Hernandez and R.A. Wagner was crucial.

Over the course of eight weeks, cast and crew have both prepared this production of *In the Heights* and carried on many conversations about community and identity. The exchange of so many perspectives was a truly enriching experience that directly informs the performance. Community members, faculty, guest artists, students, and staff equally own the work you will see onstage. Enjoy the show!


