In Honor of Willard McRae



Willard McRae devoted his life to connecting people to the services and care they need the most. McRae was a proud founder of the Wesleyan University Upward Bound Program and made major contributions to many local organizations. Willard was the first African-American to chair the Board of Directors at Liberty Bank and was a founding director of both the Liberty Bank Foundation and the Community Foundation of Middlesex County. At the time of his retirement in 1996, Willard was the Administrative Director of the Middlesex Hospital Mental Health Clinic. For his distinguished service, Willard has received numerous awards including the Middletown Press 2015 Person of the Year, the Sherry and Herb Clark Beacon of Philanthropy Award from the Community Foundation of Middlesex County and the Middlesex United Way Community Leadership Award. McRae passed away in February 2016 at the age of 82 and left a legacy of helping others who needed it.

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

College Fair and Cyber Safety Workshops

In March, our students attended a college fair workshop where they learned the basics about attending a college fair. They learned that first impressions are key and were informed of proper etiquette when it comes to meeting a college admissions counselor. They received this information from Wesleyan admission counselors themselves. There was also a presentation for students and parents on cyber safety by Lieutenant West from the Public Safety Department at Wesleyan. In addition, there was another financial aid workshop for seniors, which included a visit from one of our former students - Daniella Dennis. She graduated last year and just finished up her first year at Central Connecticut State University. She spoke to students about how she paid all of her tuition through scholarships she got on her own, as well as her experiences in college.

NACAC National College Fair

The National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) hosted its annual National College Fair in Hartford in March. A group of our students took advantage of the opportunity to meet admissions representatives from over 300 colleges and universities from the US and abroad. Students were able to put to use the college fair etiquette skills they practiced at the Saturday Session earlier that month.

He was very involved on campus and in the community, including My Brother's Keeper (Invisible Men). He graduated this year and spoke to students about his experiences in college, his advice, and his plans after graduation.

Ascend

The Ascend Program is an exciting program designed to help students prepare for future educational goals through tutoring, hands-on enrichment projects, cultural field trips, and special events. The Ascend students are required to meet after school twice each week with a Wesleyan student who will assist with homework assignments, schoolwork, hands-on enrichment sessions in math, science, music, art, social studies, language arts, music, and technology. The Ascend students went on a trip to National Museum of Mathematics (MoMath) and the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum in New York.

Let's Get Ready SAT Prep

The Spring edition of the Let's Get Ready (LGR) SAT Prep course for juniors got underway in February at Wesleyan and ran until the beginning of May. The course included an Intro Session for students and parents, a pre and post diagnostic test (to measure improvement), and 16 classes, which met Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5:30-8:30pm. The course prepared students for the May SAT, and included registration for the test and fee waivers (so registration fee of about \$55 dollars waived). The course also contained a college prep element, including college essay draft writing and a college visit to Eastern Connecticut State University. Students were coached by trained Wesleyan students. A final ceremony with gifts, awards, and a financial aid presentation wrapped up the course.
