TELL US ABOUT YOUR CURRENT RESEARCH

Currently, I am working on my dissertation, which examines the transnational life of the domra & balalaika (Russian plucked lutes) music brought by Russian émigrés to the United States in the early twentieth century. My project involves historical research, ethnography as well as music and sound analysis. One of the most exciting (and challenging) things that got me interested in this topic is the lack of previous research on these music communities and their role in the formation of Russian national sonic identity in the West.
